The idea was simple, do a six-week series on Ephesians, with each member of the ministry team tackling one of the topics each Sunday. The existing, and newly launched house groups would then enjoy fellowship and lively discussions around the topic just covered that Sunday. The Ephesians series was a great success with all the ministry team enjoying tackling a topic within a series, and also all the house groups having had wonderful time together, with much laughter and discussion.

This term Dave Britton has put together a series on Isaiah, in consultation with the ministry team. Once again there has been thoughtful and engaging study as the Old Testament has challenged the way in which we think about God. This term we have started recording the sermons and putting the readings and the house group questions in the weekly bulletin so that those unable to go out can still participate. We also started a new house group bringing the total up to five, with approximately 45 members in all.

The house groups have been a great way of getting to know each other better, form a closer sense of church community, and also engage with the Bible in more depth.

If any member is ill and unable to attend, they are remembered in our prayers. A special Christmas party lunch was held once again on our December date. At present there are 29 people in the rota of helpers, who serve in teams of six, three times a year, to lay the tables, collect the money (and bookings for next time), give out free raffle tickets, serve the food, take round tea and coffee, WASH UP, and tidy the church hall at the end of the event. They work hard but also enjoy the fellowship and buzz.

Evelyn Dennington is the head chef, responsible for planning the menus, buying the food, and ensuring that it is prepared in accordance with current Health and Safety regulations. She is an incredible lady, who has done such a lot for the club over the years. Finsetta Cummings is another amazing lady who beavers away preparing vegetables, many of which she has grown on her allotment.

They have been joined in the kitchen this year by Pat Marsh, who comes each month to do the heavy duty washing of the pots and pans, and assist

the others in leaving the kitchen absolutely spotless and hygienic for next time. Pat stepped in at short notice when Monica Shipp had to “retire” from the job due to illness. The Club is extremely grateful to Pat for taking over this unsung service.

Music at The Good Shepherd

During the year the choir has continued to lead the singing of the congregation at the scheduled services – and our congregation sings really well! We also provide an anthem during Communion at the 10am service – there is enormous variety in what we sing and all that matters is that it is good of its kind and relates closely to the theme of the service.

Apart from singing regularly at 10 o'clock we have sung at special services throughout the year – a service of words and music for Holy Week on Palm Sunday evening, a service of remembrance on All Souls' afternoon, and at the Advent and Christmas Carol Services etc. This gives us an opportunity to sing other liturgical music and sometimes there is a chance to sing an anthem which would not fit easily into the regular post-Communion slot. We meet regularly to practice each week (except during August) and know each other's weaknesses and strengths which makes us very supportive of each other. What binds us together is that we are in the choir because we love music and our music is part of the worship we offer to God.

We present two concerts each year which raise money for different charities, alternating local and national good causes and providing an opportunity for choir members and those in the audience to sit and chat together in the Church over the excellent bring and share tea which always follows these concerts. (Very many thanks to the volunteer tea makers!) Again the music is varied, encompassing the Beatles and unaccompanied folksongs! We enjoy, together with The Good Shepherd Players, a Welsh Evening with appropriate music and words, and other events throughout the year. We love singing carols with the Sunday Lunch Club before their Christmas lunch, had a lovely carol evening at Orchard Park School and sang carols round the tree at the Kingsway Flats.

We respond, wherever possible, to invitations from local organisations to provide entertainment – we have visited Havenfield, Harry Scott Court and the St. Raphael Club. We have been invited to sing carols in our local Budgens for the last few years.

One exciting new development this year has been the formation of a youth group. Some of our younger members now lead the Communion hymn at All Age services (while the choir members receive communion) and we are planning for more instrumental involvement in the coming year. Watch this space!

Another pleasure this year has been the opportunity to sing the Psalms in a variety of formats (from Responsorial Psalms to modern songs) as the Gradual Hymn. This has proved popular with the congregation as well as the choir and we are glad that we shall be adopting this pattern in future except during the penitential seasons of Advent and Lent when we shall revert to saying the Psalms.

Our regular members provide us with four part harmony and we benefit from occasional visits from relatives and past members. Do think about joining us. Finally, we particularly thank our congregation for the support they give the choir and the music of the church.

Orchard Park

This year has seen exciting developments in our work on the Orchard Park estate. David's excellent relationship with the school laid the foundation for Anthony's involvement since Erica started there in June. Anthony is now a school governor, takes monthly assemblies, assists with RE lessons and runs a thinking skills club. Edmore Moyo and his family also live on Orchard Park and have become increasingly involved with activities in the community and the church.

In the wider community, we have had involvement with families through baptisms and weddings, and have worked closely with Carly Meagher, the Community Development Officer, on community events such as the carol service, and Finsetta also helped out with gardening tips at the Big Grow in February. We gave a presentation in November to the newly formed Community Council about our work and vision which was well received and we now have a regular slot in the new community newsletter.

In September we began a weekly prayer meeting in one of the school's community rooms, bringing together Christians living on the development who wouldn't otherwise know each other because they are members of different churches. This meeting, led alternately by Edmore and Anthony, now attracts about a dozen Christians from the development.

As a direct result of the prayer and discernment that has gone on at those meetings, the Orchard Park Community Church will start after Easter on Sunday afternoons in the community centre. It is hoped that this will attract many of the Christians who already live on the development as well as their neighbours so that it can become truly representative of the community it serves.

Pastoral Care

Pastoral care continues to be a large and very important part of our ministry here at the Good Shepherd, and part of this work is undertaken by the Pastoral Team on behalf of the Church. However, this also

happens informally amongst members of the congregation and we greatly value these contacts and rely on them to alert us to people's needs. At the time of writing the team consists of five active members, two of whom are authorized by the Bishop, having completed the Diocesan course on Pastoral Care; they are now ALMs, Authorised Lay Ministers, with the Reader/Licensed Lay Minister as team co-ordinator. We visit those who are ill at home or in hospital, the elderly at home and those who live in Residential Homes in the Parish. We also offer care and support for people who are bereaved.

During the last year we have been developing a new initiative. People seeking Baptism for their children or for themselves are invited by the Vicar to come to our all-age service on the first Sunday of the month, and after the service two members of the Pastoral Team meet with families and assist them with filling in the appropriate forms. Whenever possible the team members will be present at the Baptism and will make a follow-up visit to the family. For the 4 years following their baptism children are invited back to an all-age service at the time of the anniversary and are presented with a card during the service. We hope that this helps people to feel welcomed and encourages them to keep in contact with the church.

The team meets regularly every four to six weeks for training purposes; anything that is discussed at those meetings is treated with total confidentiality.

Being alongside people who are in any kind of need is a way of living out our faith and following in the footsteps of Christ. We believe that through us he exercises his ministry of healing and we see Pastoral Care as our particular part of the Healing Ministry of the Church.

Social Awareness

I was licensed as an Authorised Lay Minister in the field of social awareness in September. Our course had covered many aspects of social awareness and it was rather daunting to know where to begin! However, I am pleased to report that there is a lot going on in the area of social

awareness in our church at the present time. I hasten to add that most of what is afoot is not directly due to my efforts!

In November, together with our other ALMs and church wardens, I attended a talk given by Archbishop John Sentamu. As you may imagine, it was very inspiring and focused on how the churches can reach out into the community. In his inimitable way, the Archbishop reminded us that we can't wait for our community to wander into our church – we must go to them. We must find ways to engage with the community and find out where there is a need.

The very next day, Linda Dean and I set off at an early hour for London to attend a day which dealt with the same subject – reaching out to the community.

It was amazing to be there with over six hundred other people, all with the same desire! Again, the message was clear – find out where there is a need and try to help. Linda and I were very excited as we heard lots of ideas, but we also took note that it was best to do one thing at a time!

Linda and I recently met with Dave Maher to discuss the idea of appointing a family worker who would work with our church to offer help to families who might need it. This is still being discussed, but it is an exciting prospect. Linda and I also mentioned the idea we had brought from the course – “Love Arbury” where a group of churches would get together to provide a Christmas hamper for families who might otherwise not have much at Christmas. We are not sure whether this scheme is already underway here, so we will be investigating, as obviously we don't want to duplicate. Anything we would like to undertake would of course, need to be ratified by the PCC.

We are very grateful to Clare and Simon Redfern, who have been inspiring us to “greenness” by organising some films for us to watch and discuss. As I write this, about twelve of us have met twice – the first time to watch *An Inconvenient Truth* and the second to watch *The Age of Stupid*. We had very thoughtful and interesting discussions after both these films. Dave Maher has been looking at some information from “Eco Congregation”. This also contains a church audit which we can complete to help us know where to start! During our discussions, the idea of solar panels for our church cropped up and we all felt that this would not only help us a church to play our part in conserving the world's resources, but also send a real message to our community that our church is concerned with environmental issues. Of course, as Christians, we all believe that we must take care of the beautiful world that God has given us.

So then, we have a few projects to think about at the moment. Please pray for God's guidance as we try to work out as a church what we should be doing in our community at this time.

Good Shepherd Scouts, Cubs and Beavers

This year has seen good growth for the 18th Cambridge, while celebrating its 40th Birthday this year. With the success of the website as a source of information for parents, kids and leaders we are now running a trial Facebook and YouTube page with plans this year to allow young members to start having an active input across all media. The goal being to build on last year's success of becoming a well known community brand.

We held our first family camp in 2009 with great success at Phasels Wood and we have had near weekly requests by parents for a follow up camp (that is planned for 2011). During the year gap we will be holding a family day to celebrate the group's birthday. We hope to continue growing our strong relationship with parents into 2011 and beyond.

With a successful grant application combined with group funds we were able raise funds to update and modernise our group camping equipment including three new twin pod tents, two day tents, and other essential equipment. This has allowed us to improve the outdoor activities we have on offer for all youth members.

Beaver Colony

The Beaver colony has continued with another strong year. 20 members aged 6-8 are currently enjoying a host of activities, including a trip to the seaside where they were given an opportunity to bury a leader in the sand,

various hikes by day and night, plus a number of themed crafts and games. The Beavers have worked closely with the Cubs during the beginning of the 40th anniversary celebrations by performing a nativity play for parents, friends and family, and participating in the Family camp, which was attended by 40 members of the group at a Hertfordshire campsite in September.

Emma Roberts and Simon Gates continue to lead the colony, though they have been grateful for the assistance of Stef Barker, who is returning part-time after a break from Scouting, and local youth worker Alison Flack. The colony has plans for more sleepovers and outings in the Summer, including a trip to Drayton Manor Theme Park.

Cub Pack

This past year the Cub Pack has gone from strength to strength with between 26-28 young members and a stronger Leadership team. We have introduced new helpers and have welcomed young leaders joining the section. The focus of the year has been 40 years of scouting, looking back at scouting activities of the past. To do this for one term we reintroduced the old arrow badges and produced our own replica of the cub scout badge work book. We even banned all talk and use of any modern technology unless it was around 40 years ago.

The Cubs have enjoyed nights away at both group and district events including a recent trip the Bradfield Park for a weekend of climbing, karting and caving.

Scout Troop

In September 2008 the 18th Cambridge Scout Troop was re-established after approximately 30 years of non-existence. It was restarted with just 4 scouts but over the last 18 months has grown to almost 20 who all are relatively young being in the lower age limits of the age range for the section. The troop leadership team has recently undergone some changes and now has a fully committed SL and ASL, a small number of Occasional Helpers and is very well supported by the other leaders and sections within the group.
