According to Stephen Hawking, Earth is 'a medium size planet around an average star in the outer suburbs of an ordinary spiral galaxy, which is itself only one of about a million million galaxies in the observable universe.' The Milky way, this has an 'ordinary spiral galaxy' measures 621,000 million, million miles across and contains about a million million stars! If we could travel at the speed of light (186,282 miles per second) it would take four years to get there.

Which begs the question, 'What is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him?' Psalm 8v4

Psalm 8 paints a picture of King David walking out into a peaceful night and looking up at the star filled sky. He begins to reflect on the glory of God in creation and he starts to wonder about why God should care for us and our place in this vast universe. As David reflected on creation and his place in it and he poured out praise. Job, found himself in the same place as David, considering the same things, wrestling with the same concept but whilst struggling with bereavement and loss. His response was not of praise but of complaint and despair – he wanted God to consider him less and look at the rest of creation. (Job 7:17-21) Life's events and changes challenge us. Sometimes we may feel so small that God has abandoned us or turned against us. Sometimes we feel that that there are far more important things than us and our problems so God couldn't possibly be interested. It isn't so. God had not abandoned Job and eventually Job became ready to see how God really cared for him. God was 'mindful' of Job and he is 'mindful' of us. Whatever our life's circumstances, his love does not falter.

As King David concludes, God has given us a unique place in his creation, one that brings responsibility. We are made by him and for him, and only with him do we have life in all its fullness. (John 10v10)

Tiny? Yes. Insignificant? No.

## Carbon Fields

'Archers' fans will know that David and Ruth are serious about keeping their grass pastures in good health for their herd of Hereford beef cattle and the dairy cows. Graham Harvey, agricultural editor of the 'Archers', has written a well researched book (*Carbon Fields*) describing how permanent pasture land is helping to store carbon.

Producing the food we eat today contributes somewhere between 17% and 32% of greenhouse gases (ghg) to the atmosphere. This comes from using fossil fuels in producing fertilisers, pesticides and herbicides, running farm machinery, storage (especially refrigeration), supply chains (lorries, ships and planes); felling tropical rainforest to make space for growing soya to feed cattle and palm oil which is in 10% of our food as vegetable oil; plus methane from farm animals.

However, farming can also be part of the solution. Agriculture can help to reduce the amount of ghgs by locking up, or sequestering, carbon in the soil. The world's soils are a reservoir of carbon. Farming methods determine whether soils take up carbon or emit it. The UK Royal Society estimates that carbon capture by the world's farmlands could total 10 billion tons of CO<sub>2</sub> a year – IF soils are well managed.

Permanent grassland (e.g. clover rich, mixed species of plants with deep-rooting herbs) takes up and stores carbon. Soils cultivated each year with annual crops release carbon into the atmosphere. 80% of the world's agricultural land is cultivated with annual crops such as rice, wheat and maize. (These three crops alone supply us with 50% of our food energy).

The traditional way to produce food from pasture is to raise grazing animals. Grass-fed meat is good for the animals and the planet. Grassland can supply: beef, lamb, milk, butter and cheese. Raising cows and sheep on permanent grassland also releases less carbon, as grain is not being grown on former rainforest land and transported around the world to feed animals. No oil-based fertilizers are needed to fertilise the grass – manure does that. One climate related problem of livestock farming is the production of methane from the animals. A number of plants found in species rich, natural grasslands reduce methane emissions from animals grazing on them.

Visit your nearest Farmers' Market and you will almost certainly find stalls selling cheese and meat from local grass-fed animals, plus local vegetables and preserves.

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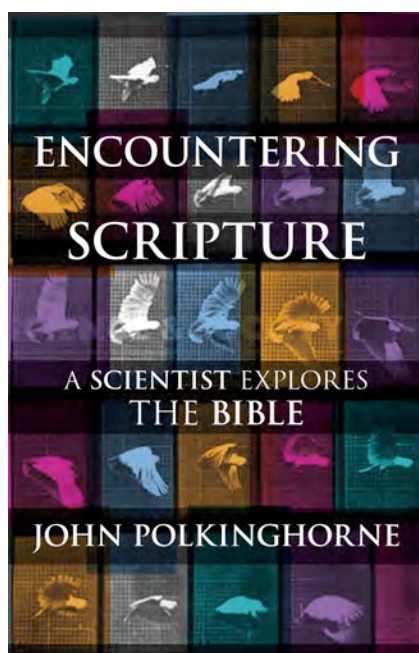
***Encountering Scripture. A Scientist explores the Bible***  
**by John Polkinghorne**

I have two suggestions, (no, three!) to make about this book. First, make sure you read it. Secondly, don't read it without a Bible close at hand or you will be as frustrated as I was when I read it on a train. Thirdly, don't read it when you have a nosy person in the next seat! I know I snorted with laughter over the sentence about the pelican (you'll have to read it to find out!) and the man in the next seat spent the next 15 minutes trying to see what I was reading. I made sure he saw the cover before I reached King's Cross – his face was a picture!

Very generously John has dedicated this book to all of us at The Good Shepherd – that's one reason you should read it. But a much better reason is that it is extremely readable and pitched at just the right level. If you are worried that it is a mighty tome, don't be. It has about 100 pages and that is divided into ten chapters – each one easy to read at a sitting. In so much of it I could hear John's voice so clearly – he might have been talking just to me. As always with John's writings and sermons there were unexpected nuggets that startled you into attention. His comment on Jesus' use of Amen at the *beginning* of his sayings such as the Sermon on the Mount and a very thought provoking paragraph on the nature of the body of Christ. The Classicist in me was fascinated by the comment that in the early chapters in the Gospels the verbs are all in the active voice (Jesus did such and such) but in the narrative of the final week in Jerusalem they become passive (such and such was done to Jesus). I shall go back and have a good look at my Greek New Testament.

Thank you, John, for the best journey to and from London to see my Mum for a long time. Thank you too for the suggestions for extra reading at the end – I now know what I shall be spending my birthday present from Mum on.

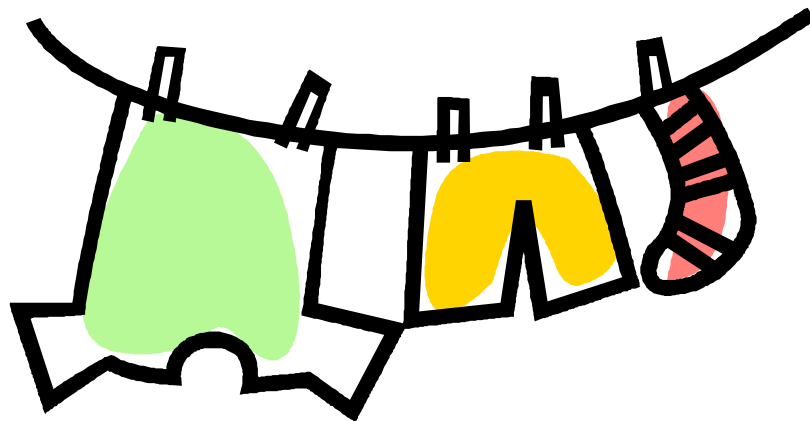

Time heals almost everything. Give time time.

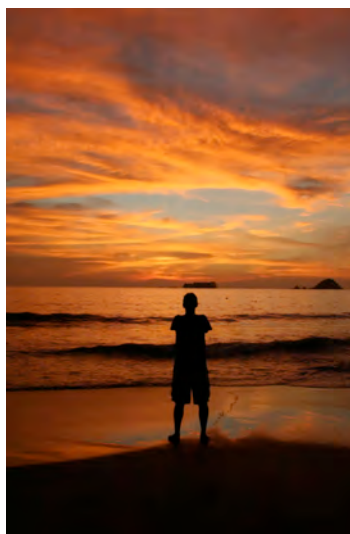
God loves you because of who God is, not because of anything you did or didn't do.

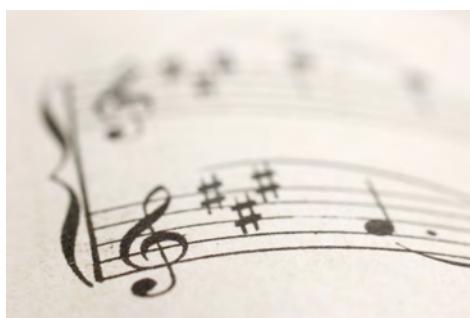

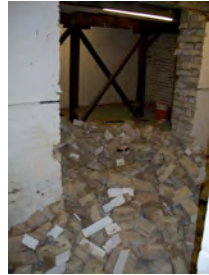
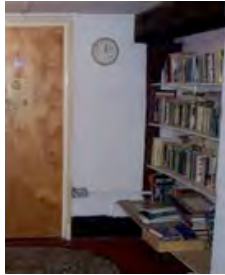
### **Postage Stamps**

## What's happening at Jimmy's?

After months of anticipation, work is at last underway for the new Jimmy's. Phase one started in April, builders are now converting the basement under Zion Baptist Church (once our lovely quiet room, laundry and storage area) into a temporary night shelter or 'decant', prior to major works beginning in the existing Jimmy's and the three floors above, currently the church hall and offices.

Before work began, the team at Jimmy's had weeks of finding homes for everything that was being stored in the basement – food, blankets, toiletries, guest belongings, cleaning materials, spare clothing – and finding alternative sites. Once cleared, in moved the builders.

Jimmy's manager, Bev Williams, said: 'To see the work begin is very exciting. Many months of preparation have gone into this first phase, where we are aiming to provide a comfortable, short-term facility for our guests, ensuring the move between the two basements goes as smoothly as possible. There's no doubt amenities will improve for guests in the temporary shelter: a new kitchen and bathrooms, plus fewer people sharing each bedroom should make life a little easier for all.'

The main build – transforming Jimmy's from a basic shelter into a 24-hour support centre – commences once we move into the decant later this summer.

The new Jimmy's will be open by 2012, providing accommodation and facilities over four floors. Importantly, 'Jimmy's 2012' will offer a range of extended daytime activities and support, vital for giving people the best chances of moving onto a more sustainable, independent lifestyle. The building will provide far greater access to space and light, so making it a more pleasant environment in which to live and work.

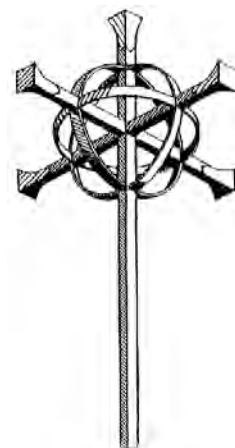
