Preparing to say 'yes'

Four years ago, on the last day of my selection conference, those of us applying for ministry in the Church of England were challenged with this prayer by Dag Hammarskjöld:

Lord, For all that has been "Thank you." For all that is to come, "Yes!"

In this, we became freshly aware of the vulnerability of the calling we were exploring: we would need to be ready to say 'yes' to all that was to come, regardless of whether we received a 'no' or a 'yes' outcome from the Panel itself.

As I await my ordination into the priesthood in just three weeks from the writing of this, I find myself revisiting this prayer. Can I dare still to pray it? Did I really dare to pray it back then?! As I read through the vows I am shortly to declare in Ely Cathedral, I am mindful of the things that will certainly come along in my ministry: painful, exhausting, confusing, embarrassing, boring and perhaps, sometimes even futile, things. Will I still say 'yes' with all my being to There will surely be many those? times when I want to side-step them, preferring to say 'yes' to what appears more fruitful, efficient, enjoyable, humanly impressive....

However, as with every journey of Christian discipleship, its purpose is not to make ourselves comfortable and safe, but to follow Christ into places where His light, life and love are to be shared with others. That we are asked and enabled to participate in this work of His at all is staggering! It is how we can be thankful, even if the 'all that has

been' has been very, very far from what we would chose for ourselves.

The two parts of this prayer must sit together. We can only really say an unconditional 'yes' to all that is to come if we have been able to say 'thank you' for all that has already been. To say an unconditional 'yes' to a God whom has not already shown Himself to be ever gracious, compassionate and merciful, would be foolhardy and wrong. Ultimately, it is thankfulness that sustains our capacity to continue to entrust our 'yes' to Him, come what may.

And so, as I prepare to be ready to say 'yes' on July 2nd, I am taking time to look back over the faithfulness of the Lord over the years to me, and over the centuries to all His people. I am taking time to notice the signs of His love and blessing for the people and places of Arbury and King's Hedges. taking time to re-learn how to say 'thank you' to the One who works through everything to bring 'all that is to come' into His Kingdom of peace, forgiveness and great joy.

This Petertide, might you too be deeply blessed in your 'thank you' and in your 'yes'.

The second most miserable sounding band from Manchester wrote a song with the great line "I was looking for a job and then I found a job...and heaven knows I'm miserable now."

There are many opportunities to help out within churches and I can confirm that they don't all result in the wailing and gnashing of teeth.

I was asked a few years ago now about helping with the youth work. While growing up I went to a group that didn't necessarily help with my faith immediately but gave something that has stayed with me. Helping out wasn't something I had ever considered but I could remember the effort that others had made and was willing to give it a try. It hasn't always been easy but it has provided encouragement to be involved with helping the next generation to consider what they believe.

Other fun things that I help with include selling the bric-a-brac at the jumble sales. It's fun seeing the random collection of donated items and feeling the challenge in trying to sell it.

Often the work in churches isn't shared out because nobody asks for help and nobody thinks of offering without being asked. The only way to work around this is to encourage those who are busy to ask for help and to encourage those who might be able to do something to get involved. There are different levels of commitment from things that are needed every week, to being on a rota to help every 6 weeks, to something that happens a couple of times each year.

Some possible jobs (in no particular order) include gardening, flower arranging, making coffee, selling things, welcoming people, decorating the church for Christmas, carrying the cross, visiting the housebound, knitting, cooking (for lunch club or holiday lunches), serving communion wine, singing, helping with Sunday school or Godly Play....

Why not pick something you've never done before? If you're not sure who to ask then speak to a churchwarden or one of the ministry team. Go on...you might actually enjoy it!

At the same time, given wise and hard working leadership, I believe the GS has always been able to combine continuity and change in an exemplary way. At times this has been difficult, I am sure; but unity (i.e. attracting children and families as well as thinking adults) has been maintained and the Spirit has not been quenched. Praise be for all that!

May God, in his mercy and love, continue to bless and inspire you all to "keep the faith" in these turbulent times.

Canon Hugh Searle and his wife were with us at the beginning of June to say goodbye as they are moving to Scotland. Hugh was of enormous help to us in the period before David joined us. He really looked after us and we grew to love him and his wife

Hugh referred to past Vicars of The Good Shepherd whom he had known and mentioned Canon Martin Suter. We are delighted that we have his daughter, Cathy, worshipping with us and recently we have had the privilege of witnessing the baptism of Martin's great granddaughter at our church. For long established members of The Good Shepherd, here is a reminder of our church's past. For newer members perhaps it will show the long connection between our church and service in the community. For me, it is also a link with music and our church – at the Baptism the choir sang a beautiful hymn which Martin had written. The obituary was written by the Revd. Peter Cameron who was Martin's successor here. Thank you to Gwen Green who unearthed an Ely Ensign from February 1990 and passed it on to me. Thanks be to God for all that Martin and Peter gave to this church community.

For Martin, the last eighteen months have been a time of waiting – waiting which Barbara and the family shared with him, and worked so lovingly, with other loving helpers, to make as bearable as possible for him. It is our honour to be with Barbara, and with Jeremy, Cathy and Tim, and their families, to celebrate the end of this waiting; for with Martin we can say at this altar, in Isaiah's words, "This is the Lord, we have waited for him, we will be glad and rejoice in his salvation".

We know we can say this with Martin, because Martin is a man of faith whose like we are not aware of seeing very often. He is someone who has known from his youth – indeed, we are given to believe from his childhood – that his life is hid in Christ with God. In this sense his whole life has been the time of waiting spoken of by Paul in Romans, "If we hope for what we do not see, then do we with patience wait for it (8.25)

This conveys also the sense of waiting upon God in prayer: for Martin is pre-eminently a man of prayer, whose fundamental attention is so fixed on God that he does not even realise how deeply God's love warms us through him, as he gives each that close attention we value so much.

Martin's early life was active, springing from the active lives of a father and mother given to the work of the Universities' Mission to Central Africa (now united with the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel as the USPG). Martin's mother was a missionary teacher when he was born at Fort Beaufort in South Africa, and his father was rector of Grahamstown before they returned to this country in 1919m on his father's appointment within the London administration of the UMCA.

The time of a chorister is not inactive, and Martin made the most of his time at Magdalen College School, Oxford, where a chorister can continue to eighteen after leaving the College Choir when his voice breaks. Martin was an energetic oarsman; Captain of Rugby football; and shot for his school, going on to shoot at Bisley as a member of the Rifle Club of Great Britain.

We should not be surprised, therefore, that when war broke out the year after Martin went up to read English at St. Edmund Hall, Oxford he was commissioned as a young officer, at first in the Somerset Light Infantry guarding beaches in Kent, but soon transferring to the King's African Rifles. He served in Abyssinia, and then, with a period at Quetta Staff College, in Burma, as a major in Intelligence, twice mentioned in despatches.

Barbara tells me it was Martin's experience of war against the Japanese that moved him to seek ordination – at that time with the aim of taking the Gospel to Japan. We are fortunate that after a

year at Cuddesdon Martin settled to the life for which he was so evidently designed, that of an English parish priest. After three years at All Saints', Acton, Martin married into the curacy of All Saints', Friern Barnet in May 1950; and it is there I am proud to claim my own first acquaintance with Martin and Barbara, for there my father was Martin's vicar.

My first recollection, like those of many here today, are of a young priest who was thoroughly enjoying *everything* – and particularly music. A pianist, composer, and singer (with an excellent tenor voice), Martin introduced me to music I had not met before>

My last memory of that period, before our ways diverged for 25 years, is of Jeremy's Christening at St. Mark's, Noel Park in north London, where Martin was vicar from 1953 to 1968. Here the man of action and the man of prayer became completely one, where the daily mass was foundation of, for example, care of the homeless, which led to Martin's helping to found one of the early housing trusts; of work with ex-prisoners and others who eked out their life on the railway sidings – work carried out in co-operation with the Salvation Army; and of much more. The floor and roof were renewed in the church hall, and always there was the visiting; the availability for counselling; the swift response, at any hour, to bereavement or illness or other trouble, of which people still speak also at The Good Shepherd, as in Martin's other parishes.

The move to Little Downham gave a change to a village setting where Martin and Barbara could be involved in the life of the whole community; the *whole* community could know him and love him and did so. But Martin and Barbara were allowed only four years to be so much at home in the country – where gardening became an abiding interest; where wine-making grew and flourished; where in peaceful moments birds could be watched.

The call to The Good Shepherd came in 1972, and the following ten years were filled with worship, visiting, completing the church building, founding King's Hedges Ecumenical Centre – and with curates!

The regard in which Martin is held in our diocese was expressed by Bishop Peter Walker and Jean, whose last visit to Martin was their final call in the diocese as they drove away into retirement.

Martin was an active member of the Movement for the Ordination of Women; he set himself to be active also in other causes and organisations he felt to be important for the life of our society and of the world – among them CND, the Anti-Apartheid Movement, the Labour Party and the Royal British Legion. His citizenship in Cambridge he specially delighted to express as the Mayor's Chaplain.

At the time of life when many clergy are content to retire, Martin moved to a fresh sphere, where his priestly nature could be totally involved for the last five years of his stipendiary ministry. At Papworth Everard, Martin quickly became equally loved in the parish, the settlement and the hospital.

Time would fail me to list in full the toddler groups, lunch clubs, men's and women's groups, carnivals, MU branches and other organisations and events (not forgetting concerts) which Martin set up and maintained in his parishes – he was Ely Diocesan Chaplain to the Mothers' Union for many years. In addition to these parish activities Martin was a valued retreat conductor, Confessor and spiritual director; and from his own retreat each year, with continued

reading, and unfailing attention to the Mass and Daily Office, Martin derived a store of wisdom which he was diligent in putting into preaching and teaching.

This is only a minimal account of the life that is now being offered to God, by a saint drawing us with him towards mature humanity in the fullness of Christ. We all shall miss Martin for what he is to each of us, and we unite in our loving support of Barbara and their family. But we also say again with them for Martin as we gather to the altar, "This is the Lord, we have waited for him, we will rejoice and be glad in his salvation".

Youth at Church of the Good Shepherd:

The Church of the Good Shepherd have a youth group that is for young people year 8 and above. Each week at the beginning of youth, we talk about our weeks, share jokes and play games, eat sweets (and TOAST!).

During February half term the group took part in Be the Change (a YFC Event), one of the youth group helpers, Murray, was involved with it and it took place at Arbury Road Baptist Church. In the morning we had sung worship and listened to talks then after lunch we went out into the local area to meet with people and talk about God, it was really interesting to meet with others and talk about our faith.

The church youth group has really helped me with my faith. It has allowed me in a fun and energetic way to refine and fully understand my faith and what I feel comfortable with. One example of the ways we discovered our own faith was when we thought about the Holy Trinity and how God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit are all different but all the same. Youth group really brings faith together allowing the group to talk about and discover all aspects of it. We normally look at a specific excerpt from the Bible to help us learn and study in that session, often its tied into what was spoken about at the morning service. (first published in 2012 in 'TEACH US OF LOVE')


As I survey the cluttered shelves And bookcase tops I wonder why We hoard these diverse things. There's some


