



Divine interruption

Recently, I have been pondering how often the character of our Christian faith is revealed in how we respond to being interrupted (and, as I sit down for the fourth time to this sentence alone - thanks to the demands of a small boy - I know mine isn't looking very patient!).

Interruptions take shape in so many ways to: our own health and that of loved ones; our plans and dreams; our political frameworks; the basic fabric of our day-to-day living. 'O Lord,' we cry, 'why this? Why now? What will this mean?' Being interrupted as we think, speak or are doing something, unsettles and frustrates us at the very core of our beings. Interruptions can be rude, urgent, frightening, unnecessary or irritating. Of course, sometimes they can also be joyful or exhilarating, but more usually it is not our first association with them. The challenge to hold our tongue, seek wisdom or respond in love and trust can be so hard when we are caught off-guard.

Being interrupted displaces us from a pattern of expectations that we have held at a given time and can change both our emotions and experiences in an instant. Interruptions can therefore also open spaces for the possibility of transformation, new vision and learning. Indeed, as people of faith, accepting that we have lives that not only can, but *must*, be interrupted by others, by the world and by God is exactly how we encounter grace. It is how we allow the Spirit to mould us, rather than keeping hold of the illusion of our own control.

Through Advent, we are asked to prepare again to be interrupted. We are called to be ready for our humanity to be made one with divinity; for the beginning of a life so full and so glorious that nothing in all creation is to be left untouched by its light and hope. And yet, how could we ever be ready for such an interruption?! I am grateful to a friend for introducing me to the following poem by Mary Oliver:

*Dear Lord, I have swept and I have washed but
Still nothing is as shining as it should be
for you. Under the sink, for example, is an
uproar of mice—it is the season of their
many children. What shall I do?
And under the eaves
and through the walls the squirrels*

*have gnawed their ragged entrances—but it is the
season
when they need shelter, so what shall I do? And
the raccoon limps into the kitchen and opens the
cupboard
while the dog snores, the cat hugs the pillow;
what shall I do? Beautiful is the new snow falling
in the yard and the fox who is staring boldly
up the path, to the door. And still I believe you will
come, Lord: you will, when I speak to the fox
the sparrow, the lost dog, the shivering sea-goose,
know
that really I am speaking to you whenever I say,
as I do all morning and afternoon: Come in, Come in.*

(*'Making the House Ready for the Lord'*)

What shall I do? What shall we do, as disciples preparing for Christmas? It is unlikely that we will have an undivided, peaceful season of prayer and worship that is not distracted. (In my case, it is certain I shall not have a calm and organised season of timely present-buying and card-writing!) We will be pulled in multiple directions by the demands of families, friends and our own situations. For some of us, there might even be interruptions that threaten to overwhelm us, when the hope of our discipleship might be painfully put to the test.

However, as the poem puts it so beautifully, to keep the season of Advent is to go on praying: 'still I believe you will come, Lord, you will...' Amidst all my interruptions, Lord, 'know that really I am speaking to you'.

As we move into the beginning of a new Church year, do not be afraid of the interruptions that are to come. Remember that in and through them all, our Lord will come - and perhaps, just perhaps, if we invite Him to interrupt our deepest selves, then we will find more room for His love than we could ever have planned or been ready for... So, come in, come in, indeed, oh Lord!

May the hope-filled promises of Advent and the love of the Christ Child interrupt our lives and those of our hurting world, this Christmas and always, Amen.

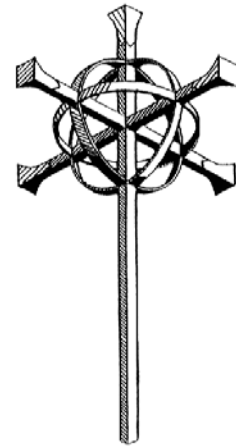
